

FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE

Figurative language is used to gain impact, freshness of expression, or pictorial effect.

Metaphor—a comparison between two unlike objects usually using “is” or “was”

*Your eyes are stars!
She was a slimy snake.
She was an ice cube from shoveling snow.*

Simile—a comparison between two unlike objects using “like” or “as”

*Your eyes are like stars!
He looks like a monster.
Your face is as red as a tomato.*

Personification—giving inhuman things human qualities

*The stars are envious of your eyes!
The moon shone down at me through my window and said good night.
The thunder and lightning talked all night.*

Idioms—phrases or expressions that have meanings different from the literal

*Don't pull my leg.
Hit the road.
Have you ever paid through the nose for something?*

Writer's Trick

Alliteration—the use of the same consonant sounds in the beginning of two or more words in a phrase or sentence

*She slipped and slid across the silken ice.
She looked up with quiet, questioning eyes.*

Multi-Meaning Words

*Cold—Having little heat
Lacking affection or sympathy
A mild illness with symptoms of sneezing, running nose, and coughing.*
